## **Chief Wallace: Police Update**

Amberley Village has always maintained a strong commitment to personalized, community policing, which we've regularly highlighted in our communication with residents. This spring, residents will have an opportunity to vote on a Police Levy Renewal, which helps fund much of what you've come to know and love about Public Safety in Amberley Village. Funding from the levy allows us to operate fully staffed, and affords us the ability to maintain our own Dispatch.

Many smaller communities - like ours - have experienced cutbacks. And while many have seen crime rates go up as a result, Amberley Village has had an overall decrease in crime. This is primarily because of the personal relationships between our Police Department and residents. It's just one of many innovative approaches to the challenges faced by our Department that has allowed us to maintain some of the lowest crime rates and best response times in the County.

I personally invite you to a Community Open House on April 28, 2022 (see page 3) to learn more about how we do this and to give residents the opportunity to get to know the men and women (and our K-9!) who protect our Village every day.

# Police Levy Renewal Won't Raise Taxes

Amberley Village residents often cite strong police services as one of the aspects they love most about living in the Village. This spring, residents will vote on the renewal of the 2017 Amberley Village Police Levy, which expires December 31, 2022.

The Police Levy was first passed in 2012 with the intention of creating a dedicated source of revenue that could only be used for the expenses of police operations and services. At that time, the Village identified the need for \$2.2 million, and the levy was intended to help by bringing in \$1.6 million annually, with the difference coming from the Village General Fund. In 2017, the Village was able to reduce the cost of the levy by 20% through identification of additional revenue streams, reduction of costs through creative partnerships, refurbishment rather than replacement of new equipment, and other innovative cost-savings techniques.

The 2017 levy, which was approved by 87% of Village voters, was reduced to 8 mills, or \$1.3 million annually. Renewal of the levy will not raise taxes. Instead, the 2022 Police Levy would renew and maintain the 8 mills, or \$1.3 million annually toward the \$3.7 million Police Department budget. As with the past five years, the remaining balance, which was \$2.4 million in 2021, would be covered by the Village's General Fund (see graphic, page 4).

Revenues from the tax levy augment funding for 18 full-time patrol officers, including one Police K-9 Unit, and five dispatch/administrative positions. Maintaining the 8 mill levy allows Amberley Village to preserve Police services at current levels, including consistent patrols, Vacation Home Checks and the many personal touches which play a vital role in minimizing Village crime rates. "Amberley Village Police Department is trained to look for things that might invite home intrusions and proactively address them, such as closing open residential garage doors and holiday package delivery at the Police Station," says Chief Wallace. "Many other communities are unable to provide this level of service, and some have experienced an increase in residential crime."

Levy funding enables Amberley Village officers to serve as first responders to all EMS calls, and helps pay the cost of Village Dispatchers, who offer around-the-

clock, personalized service to residents calling the Village for assistance. Amberley Police established an inhouse alarm system to help defray costs and preserve its Dispatchers and the ability to provide personal attention during what can often be the most critical moments of residents' lives.

Amberley Village is also widely known for its emphasis on the importance of Community Policing. To that end, Chief Richard Wallace was recently named President of the Hamilton County Police Association, and many Village officers serve in variety of capacities, including the Underwater Search & Rescue Unit, Honor Guard, SWAT and the Mobile Field Force. The Village also serves as home to Hamilton County Heroin Task Force (HCHTF) Commander Tom Fallon.

Community involvement beyond the Amberley Village borders not only raises the profile of the Village overall, but also maximizes exposure and encourages relationships, making it more likely that assistance from outside jurisdictions will be available when needed. Sharing skills and experiences with outside organizations also expands knowledge, and broadens the positive reputation of Amberley Village as a safe community, intolerant of criminal activity. And as residents regularly report, these elements make the Village a highly desirable community in which to live, work and play.





The graphics below and right demonstrate Police Department expenditures and an overview of the percentage of Police Budget spent from Levy dollars vs. General Fund. Creative funding approaches by Village staff show Police funding trending toward greater reliance on the Amberley Village General Fund, however, Levy dollars are still critical to ensuring current levels of service can be maintained.

# Village Aggregation Program Combats Increased Gas Cost

Amberley Village recently announced a change from a variable to a fixed rate for its gas aggregation program. The Village's aggregation consultant, AGE, recommended the change based on sharply rising natural gas rates leading into this winter. Low production from natural gas producers, after depleted storage levels following the winter storm in February 2021, left major concerns in the market about overall supply heading into what was forecasted by many to be a colder than normal winter.

AGE recommended its aggregation communities not leave any further upside risk to residents and instead lock into a fixed rate for the remainder of the current contract ending in October 2022. This best positioned residents to have the option between a known fixed rate commodity for this winter through the aggregation program vs a variable rate structure offered by Duke's Gas Cost Recovery price-to-compare.

#### 2021-23 Council Takes Oath of Office



## Accelerated Streets Program (ASP) **Update: Farmcrest Reconstruction**





Work will begin this spring on a total street reconstruction for North and South Farmcrest Drives as well as part of Kincaid. The map at left outlines the streets to be restored (shown in green), which will involve taking the roadway down to the dirt and complete restoration of the asphalt.

The project is part of a \$6.7 million investment by the Village in our street conditions over an eight year period. The project has been awarded to Ford Development with Fred Nemann handling water main replacement. The Farmcrest Reconstruction Project, which will begin in the Spring, carries a a total investment of \$2 million.


## Village Financial Overview

The Village ended 2021 under budget, with revenues exceeding expenses by \$145,000 and closed the year with a healthy General Fund balance.

Revenues received in 2021 were similar to those collected in 2020, even though 2020's revenue included one-time revenue of \$318,000. Earnings (income) tax remains the primary source of revenue for the Village representing 56% of our General Fund revenue. Several sources of revenue increased in 2021 while others decreased. While the increase in revenue from 2020 to 2021 was less than 1%, this amounted to \$5.8 million collected in 2021.


Expenditures totaled \$5.6 million in 2021, a 5.7% increase over 2020's expenses. This expense includes funding of Village services like police and fire protection, snow and ice control, emergency medical services, brush, and leaf collection. It also includes \$1.3 million toward our Police Department, which received 37% of its funding through the police levy for a total of \$3.6 million in police expenditures. Protecting our residents through our Police Department continues to be the largest expenditure of the Village. #### Where Do Your Property Taxes Go?

Hamilton County R3source will host a composting program in late Spring. Check out the Village website for updates!


# Rumpke Now Accepts Plastic & Aluminum Cups!
